As the melody of "High Hopes" fills the room, the flags of the United Nations and the United Arab Emirates emerge forward, sending an enthusiastic crowd into a roaring applause. Moderators carried flags from over 30 countries onto the main stage. The vibrant colors of the flags stood in solidarity with AUSMUN 2020's motto, "Embracing Diversity, Shaping the Future."

The flags of UAE and the United Nations remained proudly on stage, waving to the meaningful lyrics of our national anthem. They were held by the Director of External Relations Abdulla Al Matrooshi and Director of Human Resources Sarah Al Saeid respectively.

The spectacle spoke of a united world and signified the tranquility and unity the United Arab Emirates holds high.

With the last echo of the anthem's tune, began the string of profound speeches by the Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, the Head of the International Studies Department, faculty advisors, and esteemed guests, as well as a touching performances from the university's Preforming Arts Program.

AUSMUN 2020 was incomparable, as it hosted more than 1500 participants and over 1000 delegates. For the second consecutive year, the conference required an overflow room. The voice of leadership echoed through the room as Dr. Jeniece Lusk welcomed our delegates with Ban

Ki-moon's words, "let me start by welcoming tomorrow's leaders to today's United Nations."

The Dean of CAS Dr. Mahmoud Anabtawi encouraged the young audience to use AUSMUN as a platform to come together and find solutions through debate and open discussions. He reiterated the importance of developing the ability to disagree amicably and hone the valuable skill of successful diplomacy.

Deputy-Secretary General Aiswarya Padmanabhan acknowledged the drive that brought all those in the room together. She reminded delegates that the reason they meet is to become chief catalysts in a world that works for solutions. Padmanabhan referred to AUSMUN as the most holistic platform for young leaders to create works of marvel and reassured the delegates, stating, "Most of all, you can make a difference. Be bold. Stay true to your ideas and make sure you have fun."

Guest speaker and the Big Heart Foundation's Senior Media Coordinator Ms. Alya Obaid AlMusaiebi urged delegates to take advantage of privileges they have, reminding them that others "cannot shape their futures the way you do." She applauded the audience for participating in AUSMUN as it is a step towards shaping their future. AlMusaiebi emphasized the importance of international organizations such as the UN in expanding the reach of smaller organizations.

SECRETARY GENERAL'S SPEECH

Secretary-General Muaaz Adra expressed his gratitude to see our 13th annual conference come to life after his team spent a total of 150,000 to make it happen. Adra stated that this year's conference is remarkably unique, as it reflects our motto: "Embracing Diversity, Shaping the Future."

AUSMUN represents a manifold of people. Thus, to honor this diversity and extend the AUSMUN experience to all future leaders, Adra proudly announced establishing a second Arabic committee this year.

The chorus, "There's a lot I can be, but I won't be invisible" struck a chord with each and every hopeful mind in the audience. Choir member Nasreen AlShamsi said that Invisible spoke to all the women whose efforts go unnoticed, stressing that this disregard does not make them invisible.

"We are as equal and a part of something as everyone else in it. There is so much that we can do and just because they don't see us, that does not make us invisible," AlShamsi said.

The songs reflect AUSMUN 2020's motto "Embracing Diversity, Shaping the Future" carrying the message that there is a world out there that we have yet to learn about.

We only start shaping a better world once we embrace our differences rather than use them as a measure of competence.

"Education is here to teach us what we don't know, and nationality or religion should not stop us from learning. We can only learn more if we embrace other cultures, communities, and everyone around us," AlShamsi added.

Choir member Maria Abdirahman said that she hoped the audience appreciated the hard work that went behind coordinating a choir as diverse as theirs. "Diversity allowed us to achieve more and be more. It shapes all of our futures drastically. Look at the UAE, it's become more than you'd ever think a country could become in 40 years!," she said.

The choir performance was followed by a serene peaceful piano musicale by Dr. Jelena Djukic. She played Chopin Nocturnes, a composition by Frédéric Chopin. The soothing notes filled the air, captivating its audience with its entrancing melody. Djukic believes music has the power to unite people from around the world.

The musical performances ended in a burst of stunned applause, as attendees rose to their feet to commend the remarkable talent the performers possessed and their efforts to enliven the first evening of AUSMUN.

AUSMUN ANNOUNCES TWO ARABIC SPEAKING COMMITTEES

Following last year's unprecedented success, AUSMUN 2020 was pleased to feature two Arabic-speaking committee sessions, UNRWA and UNHCR.

Being established in Sharjah, a city that prides itself on preserving the Arabic language, it was crucial to offering and inclusive experience to non-English speaking students.

Considering the importance of the Arabic language on a global scale, consolidating these sessions as part of the conference allowed more students to gain experience debating world problems.

The establishment of a second committee session this year was led by the initiative of the Director of Human Resources Sarah Al Saeid. Al Saeid held weekly training sessions to ensure the usage of proper terminologies during the conference.

UNRWA moderator Ahmad Al Kaldi said that he was impressed with the delegates' ability to articulate their ideas as they exceeded his expectations. Students were both well-informed and eloquent, their spirits ignited through the Arabic language.

During the first day of the sessions, new delegates struggled with this challenge. However, they restored their confidence once they became familiarized with all terminologies, Al Kaldi said. Regardless, he was taken aback by the excellent Arabic speaking skills displayed during the sessions, especially during moments of improvisation.

UNRWA delegate Razan Akram described her experience as "valuable and worthy of repetition." She stressed the necessity of participating in an Arabic committee session, stating that it was crucial to boost the students' confidence and improve their Arabic speaking skills.

Given the opportunity to discuss Palestinian issues allowed her to improve her Arabic while honing in new skills such as debate, she said.

It is undeniable that speaking in Arabic presents delegates with a unique experience. Deputy of Human Resources and UNHCR moderator Mohammad Alzaabi said that Arabic sessions have a "different flavor." Considering that Arabic is their mother language, their debates hold significant meaning.

يفتتح نموذج الأمم المتحدة في الجامعة الأمريكية في الفتارقة لجنتين عربيتين

بعـد النجـاح الـذي حققـه نهـوذج الأمـم المتحـدة في الجامعـة الأمريكيـة في الشارقة العـام المـاضي، قـرر المؤتمـر افتتـاح لجنتـين عربيتـين في دورتـه لعـام ٢٠٢٠، وهـما الأونـروا ومفوضيـة اللاجئـين.

ولأن فعاليات المؤتمر تدور في مدينة الشارقة، فقد كان من الضروري أن يتم توسيع دائرة المشاركين حتى تشمل غير الناطقين باللغة الإنجليزية، وذلك تماشياً مع دور الشارقة في الحفاظ على اللغة العربية.

ولأهمية وانتشار اللغة العربية عالمياً، فقد سمحت هذه الخطوة للطلاب باكتساب مهارات تحكنهم من مناقشة قضايا عالمية.

وقد تم إضافة لجنة عربية أخرى هذا العام كخطوة بادرت فيها مسؤولة الموارد البشرية سارة السعيد. حيث حرصت السعيد على عقد جلسات تدريبية أسبوعية لضمان استخدام المتدربين للغة ومصطلحات مناسبة خلال المؤتمر.

وقال رئيس لجنة الأونروا أحمد الخالدي إن قدرة المفوضين على إيصال أفكارهم بوضوح قد أدهشته وفاقت توقعاته، حيث جمع الطلاب ما بين فصاحة اللسان والمعرفة.

وأضاف الخالدي بأنه قد واجه بعض المفوضين الجدد صعوبات وتحديات خلال اليوم الأول للمؤمّر، لكنهم سرعان ما تخطوا هذا الأمر عندما أصبحوا على دراية تامة بالمصطلحات المُستخدمة. ورغم ذلك، فقد انبهر الخالدي بتمكن المفوضين لغوياً وقدرتهم على التحدث باللغة العربية الفصحى بطلاقة، وبالأخص في لحظات الارتجال.

ووصف مفوضة لجنة الأونروا رزان أكرم تجربتها بالقيّمة وبأنها تستحق التكرار. وقد أكدت على أهمية المشاركة في إحدى لجان المؤمّر العربية، حيث يزيد ذلك من ثقة الطلاب بأنفسهم ويُحسّن من قدرتهم على تحدث العربية الفصحى. وقد أضافت بأن مناقشتها للقضية الفلسطينية قد ساهم في تحسين لغتها العربية وصقل مهاراتها الحوارية.

ولا ريب بأن التحدث باللغة العربية يوفر للمفوضين تجربة فريدة من نوعها. حيث قال نائب الموارد البشرية ورئيس لجنة مفوضية اللاجئين محمد الزعبي إن للجان العربية "مذاقاً مختلفاً." وباعتبار العربية لغتهم الأم، فإن لمناقشاتهم وحواراتهم بهذه اللغة معنى أكبر.








MEET OUR DELEGATES
